And please keep them coming because the Committee will be considering all proposals early in the new year.

Treasurer Margaret Weaver then brought us up to date with her annual statement. She advised that a comparison showed the financial situation was similar to last year. Covid had undoubtedly had an impact but membership was now steadily increasing.

The Committee had voted not to increase subscriptions and a resolution to raise the Third Age Trust fee from £4 to £7 had been rejected. However, the Treasurer warned we would continue to see the effects of the cost of living crisis on items such as room hire charges. Raising the activity groups contributions from £1 to £2 had helped particularly because more were opting to meet at external venues.



Liz Wilson tells us the Birds and Botany Group had a brilliant day when members went to Old Moor, Barnsley recently.

She says bird watching can be a bit like waiting for a bus. Nothing comes for ages then three follow in quick succession.

Sure enough this is just what happened!







"Kingfisher" said Dave and a blue flash streaked in front of the hide from right to left. The bird settled on the fourth of six fence posts half submerged in the gravel pool. It flew to the fifth and then the sixth post before returning to the third post where it turned 360 degrees to show its salmon breast and its iridescent blue back. It darted down to the water once or twice before it settled on the second post and then it was off all in the space of about ten seconds!

Ten white spoonbills treated us to some formation flying splitting into a four and a six before joining up again (a bit like the Red Arrows!). They landed nearby on a spit of land like a pack of dazzling snowy white angels.

A grey shaggy heron waited motionlessly on the edge of a pool. I said "I'm going to wait for it to catch a fish". "See you on the way back" joked Dave!

Then the bird drew its head back and stabbed into the water. "It's caught one I said ...it's a big one". And it was. We guessed it was a pike about twelve inches long.

The heron stalked on to the land and a little way up the beach before releasing it and stabbing it some more.

The pike was injured and writhed about;

then the heron took it back to the water and swished it about almost as if washing it before taking it back on land. The bird thrust its sharp beak just behind the pike's gills...and stabbed again. The pike was dead.

The bird cleaned it again and then deftly turned it upside down and swallowed it whole in a single gulp. We had witnessed a murder!

The next evening I went to the theatre in Stratford on Avon to see Macbeth and just like the buses and the birds, the murders followed in quick succession.

There have been a some positive changes with the walking group over recent months. Firstly, I have changed the name of the group from the Longer Walking group to the Monthly Ramblers. This was done to give greater clarity as to which group we are and what we do, that is hold walks once a month; usually the first Thursday.

We have welcomed several new members to the group which means we now have over twenty on our contacts list and a good turnout each month. We generally walk about 10 miles, usually in the local area or within the Peak District.

Wet weather gear needs to be carried (whatever the weather forecast) together with food and drink, and spare clothing in winter. Boots (as opposed to walking shoes) are recommended - paths can be wet at any time of the year. Walks will start locally in the winter when daylight hours are short, but may start further afield when the days are longer. Transport to the start of the walk will be on a car/petrol sharing basis. If you are not a driver that is not a problem.

Here is an outline of walks over the last few months:

May: We ascended Kinder Scout via William Clough and continued on to Sandy Heys and along to Kinder Downfall where we had lunch. We continued along the edge of the Kinder plateau to Kinder Low and Edale Cross. We descended via Tunstead Clough and returned to start point at Bowden Bridge car park.

June : We enjoyed some warm bright sunshine and lovely far reaching views along with the delightful abundance of spring/early summer wild flowers. We stayed quite local, starting from Pym Chair car park, dropping down to Thursbitch and over to Lamaload Reservoir, Blue Boar and Summer Close. From there we climbed up to Charles Head, passing via Clough Farm and over to Windgather Rocks before returning to our start point.


July: We ventured a little further afield and met at Ashopton Bridge by Ladybower Reservoir. We ascended through the bracken to Derwent Edge passing via Wheel Stones to Back Tor and Lost Lad.

We were once again blessed with some fine weather and fabulous views. We descended via Millbrook Plantation and Briery Side to the east side of Ladybower Reservoir and followed the track alongside the reservoir back to the start point.




September: We started the walk from Tideswell, climbing up out of the village and over to Wheston. We then dropped down the Pennine Bridleway to Millers Dale. From there we headed along the old railway line of the Monsal Trail which is now a popular walking and cycling route. The trail passes through two of the original railway tunnels which thankfully has low level lighting along their lengths. We eventually left the trail and followed the river via Cressbrook and Litton Mills. We then continued north to Tideswell Dale before returning to the start point.











The popularity of the Shorter Walks group means it was fully subscribed, with a waiting list to join. The solution offered, is to organise two walks per month instead of one. The existing meetings on the second Tuesday of each month will remain, with an additional meeting on the fourth Friday. Start time will usually be 10:30am allowing about two hours' activity before enjoying a pub lunch. We look for walks which, while not completely level have a more limited hill climbing requirement. Sensible footwear and suitable outdoor clothing (possibly walking poles as well) are advised, as some footpaths can be muddy or uneven in all but the best weather – and many of us will turn out whatever the weather.

The abilities of each member may vary considerably. So to accommodate this inevitable disparity, the walks will be designed with

cut-outs, shortcuts and alternatives.

It will be left to individuals to decide how much, or how little of the circuit they feel capable of achieving - the aim being to allow the slower members to catch up or even overtake the faster ones, thereby arriving at the destination more or less together, and thereafter enjoying a convivial lunch in a nearby pub.
